
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n Sept. 17, Constitution Day, I chaired a panel organized by the White House. It was an extraordinary thing. The panel's purpose was to identify what has gone wrong in the teaching of American history and to lay forth a plan for recovering the truth. It took place in the National Archives — we were sitting in front of the originals of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution — a very beautiful place. When we were done, President Trump came and gave a speech about the beauty of the American Founding and the importance of teaching American history to the preservation of freedom.

This remarkable event reminded me of an essay by a teacher of mine, Harry Jaffa, called "On the Necessity of a Scholarship of the Politics of Freedom." Its point was that a certain kind of scholarship is needed to support the principles of a nation such as ours. America is the most deliberate nation in history — it was built for reasons that are stated in the legal documents that form its founding. The reasons are given in abstract and universal terms, and without good scholarship they can be turned astray. I was reminded of that essay because this event was the greatest exhibition in my experience of the combination of the scholarship and the politics of free-

The panel was part of an initiative of President Trump, mostly ignored by the media, to counter the New York Times' 1619 Project. The 1619 Project promotes the teaching that slavery, not freedom, is the defining fact of American history. President Trump's 1776 Commission aims to restore truth and honesty to the teaching of American history. It is an initiative we must work tirelessly to carry on, regardless of whether we have a president in the White House who is on our side in the fight. We must carry on the fight because our country is at stake. Indeed, in a larger sense, civilization itself is at stake, because the forces arrayed against the scholarship and the politics of freedom today have more radical aims than just destroying America.

I taught a course this fall semester on totalitarian novels. We read four of them: George Orwell's 1984, Arthur Koestler's Dark-

ness at Noon, Aldous Huxley's Brave New World and C.S. Lewis' That Hideous Strength.

The totalitarian novel is a relatively new genre. In fact, the word "totalitarian" did not exist before the 20th century. The older word for the worst possible form of government is "tyranny" — a word Aristotle defined as the rule of one person, or of a small group of people, in their own interests and according to their will. Totalitarianism was unknown to Aristotle, because it is a form of government that only became possible after the emergence of modern science and technology.

The old word "science" comes from a Latin word meaning "to know." The new word "technology" comes from a Greek word meaning "to make." The transition from traditional to modern science means that we are not so much seeking to know when we study nature, as seeking to make things — and ultimately, to remake nature itself. That spirit of remaking nature — in-

cluding human nature — greatly emboldens both human beings and governments. Imbued with that spirit, and employing the tools of modern science, totalitarianism is a form of government that reaches farther than tyranny and attempts to control the totality of things.

In the beginning of his history of the Persian War, Herodotus recounts that in Persia it was considered illegal even to think about something that was illegal to do — in other words, the law sought to control people's thoughts. Herodotus makes plain that the Persians were not able to do this. We today are able to get closer through the use of modern technology. In Orwell's 1984, there are telescreens everywhere, as well as hidden cameras and microphones. Nearly everything you do is watched and heard. It even emerges that the watchers have become expert at reading people's faces. The organization that oversees all this is called the Thought Police.

If it sounds far-fetched, look at China today: There are cameras everywhere watching the people, and everything they do on the Internet is monitored. Algorithms are run and experiments are underway to assign each individual a social score. If you don't act or think in the politically correct way, things happen to you — you lose the ability to travel, for instance, or you lose your job. It's a very comprehensive system. And by the way, you can also look at how big tech companies here in the U.S. are tracking people's movements and activities to the extent that they are often able to know in advance what people will be doing. Even more alarming, these companies are increasingly able and willing to use the information they compile to manipulate people's thoughts and decisions.

The protagonist of 1984 is a man named Winston Smith. He works for the state and his job is to rewrite history. He sits at a table with a telescreen in front of him that watches everything he does. To one side is something called a memory hole — when Winston puts things in it, he assumes they are burned and lost forever. Tasks are delivered to him in cylinders through a pneumatic tube. The task might involve something big, like a change in what country the state is at war with: When the enemy changes, all references to the previous war with a different enemy need to be expunged. Or the task might be something small: If an individual falls out of favor with the state, photographs of him being honored need to be altered or erased altogether from the records. Winston's job is to fix every book, periodical, newspaper, etc. that reveals or refers to what used to be the truth, in order that it conform to the new truth.

One man, of course, can't do this alone. There's a film based on 1984 starring John Hurt as Winston Smith. In the film they depict the room where he works, and there are people in cubicles like his as far as the eye can see. There would have to be millions of workers involved in constantly re-writing the past.

Members of the public, interested agencies and civic groups are encouraged to provide comments to Madera County Transportation Commission Staff regarding any transportation needs not being met by the current system. Testimony should be as specific as possible with regard to those citizens, or groups of citizens, not currently served by transit, the requested type and amount of transit service, the geographic area in which service is needed and any other supporting evidence of information, which will help in the evaluation of the "reasonableness" of the requested service.

Under the California Transportation Development Act, this hearing is provided annually to take testimony from the public on potential unmet transit needs within Madera County. The Com-



One of the chief questions raised by the book is what makes this worth the effort? Why does the regime do it?

Winston's awareness of this endless, mighty effort to alter reality makes him cynical and disaffected. He comes to see that he knows nothing of the past, of real history: "Every record has been destroyed or falsified," he says at one point. "Every book has been rewritten, every picture has been repainted, every statue and street and

building has been renamed. every date has been altered. And that process is continuing day by day and minute by minute ... nothing exists and street and building has been reexcept an endless present in which the Party is always right." Does any of this sound familiar?

In his disaffection, Winston com-

mits two unlawful acts: He begins writing in a diary and he begins meeting a woman in secret, outside the sanction of the state. The family is important to the state, because the state needs babies. But the women are raised by the state in a way that they are not to enjoy relations with their husbands. And the children — as in China today, and as it was in the Soviet Union — are indoctrinated and taught to spy and inform on their parents. Parents love their children but live in terror of them all the time. Think of the control that comes

from that — and the misery.

There are three stratums in the society of 1984. There is the Inner Party, whose members hold all the power. There is the Outer Party, to which Winston belongs, whose members work for - and are watched and controlled by — the Inner Party. And there are the proles, who live and do the blue collar work in a relatively unregulated area. Winston ventures out into that area from time to time. He finds a little shop there where he buys things. And it is in a room upstairs from this shop

where he and Julia. the woman he falls in love with, set up "Every record has been dea kind of household as if they are married. They create something like a private world in that room, although it is a world with limitations — they can't even think about having children, for instance, because if they did,

they would be discovered and killed.

In the end, it turns out that the shopkeeper, who had seemed to be a kindly old man, is in fact a member of the Thought Police. Winston and Julia's room contained a hidden telescreen all along, so everything they have said and done has been observed. In fact, it emerges that the Thought Police have known that Winston has been having deviant thoughts for 12 years and have been watching him care-

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





The thing is, attack on freedom of speech you can't design a set of social rules that includes everyone excludes



Make Your Closet a Happy Place

Walking into the dentist's office. Meeting with an auditor. Being summoned by your boss during layoffs. These and other stressful situations naturally stir up negative emotions. But walking into your closet doesn't have to be one of them.

To which of these do you relate?

- *Overwhelmed* from too many choices
- Frustration from not enough choices
- *Shame* of not fitting into what you want to wear
- *Stress* of not finding what you want to wear
 - *Disgust* with piles of dirty laundry
 - Exasperation from piles of clean

Can an organized closet really combat this negativity? If organized means having what you need, use and love in designated spaces where they fit comfortably, and maintaining those spaces with supporting routines, then yes! You can make your closet a happy place. Let's break it down.

What do you need? You need clothes that fit well and look good on you — regardless of your shape or size. You don't need clothes that cause shame for not being the size you want to be, or for having spent money on something you don't wear. You also don't need clothes you're not using anymore. Give yourself permission to let go of professional, maternity and bridesmaid dresses you no longer need.

Action: Pull out the clothes that don't fit, don't look good on you, you don't like and you no longer need. Happy Easter

Editor's Note: With the passing of Aunt Jean, I have decided to bring you a "Best Of" of her recipes over the past 10 years. Good recipes are timeless and I hope you enjoy them all over again.

Since Easter is my favorite holiday of the year, either Christian or secular, I couldn't let it slide by without writing about it. We celebrate Easter Sunday because Jesus was crucified for our sins (John 3:16) died on the cross on Friday, was buried and rose from death on Sunday (Mark 16:6). The resurrection of Jesus Christ is one of the fundamental principles and beliefs of Christianity. It's why we say, "Christ is Risen - He is Risen Indeed!"

Egg Dying Time

In our families, Saturday before Easter is egg dying day. Each family with children begins with two- or

three-dozen eggs but don't always end up with that many. There are the one or two Christ Arose! I get goose bumps during the boiling and invariably there are always the ones that "acfloor.

On Easter Sunday when we get home from church, there is always egg hunts

for the kids – seems like every year there is one egg that just can't be found (until about July). Eggs are a traditional symbol of new life. According to the book Festivals and Celebrations by Rowland Purton, eggs were dyed in ancient times by the Egyptians and Persians who exchanged them with their friends. "It was in Mesopotamia that Christians first gave eggs to their friends at Easter to remind them of the resurrection of Jesus," Purton wrote.

Our Easter Feast is real simple -Baked Ham, Scalloped Potatoes, green beans, green salad, rolls and



desserts. Oh, and deviled eggs. NOT the ones that were up in a tree, behind a lawn chair or stepped on a couple of times earlier that day.

I start the eggs (I usually boil about two- or three-dozen) in cold water, and after they start boiling, turn the fire down and cook at a light boil for about 10 minutes. After the 10 minutes I usually test one to make sure it is done then IMMEDIATELY drain the hot water into the sink and turn the cold water onto the eggs. I let the cold water run on the eggs until you can pick up an egg easily then crack and peel them, leaving them whole. I have found this method the easiest to peel the egg without tearing it up. I have read of other methods but this one works best for me – if you have a method you have used, then by all means use it. After you have peeled them and they have cooled enough

> that you can handle them, cut them in half from top to bottom with a sharp paring knife, putting the yolks into a bowl and the whites on a flat surface. I have a saver that I use. If you aren't going to finish deviling them at this point be sure to put them in the

eggs that crack when the chorus is sung, "Up from the grave he arose, with a mighty triumph o'er His foes, He arose a Victor from the dark docidentally" hit the main, and He lives forever, with Tupperware cake His saints to reign. He arose! He arose! Hallelujah! Christ arose!" Have a blessed Easter.

My favorite Easter Hymn is

refrigerator.

When the eggs have been separated, put the whites in the fridge until you have the yolks ready. All I do is smash the yolks with a fork until they are kind of like corn meal. Add enough mayonnaise or Miracle Whip (I prefer Miracle Whip for most things, but in these eggs, I use half mayonnaise and half Miracle Whip) to make them moist, but not runny. If you aren't used to doing this, start with only a couple of tablespoons, and add a little at a time until you get

the consistency you want. Add a squirt of mustard (not too much) and salt and pepper to taste. Last year I added just a couple of tablespoons of sweet pickle juice. After you have the yolks tasting the way you want, put them in the whites and refrigerate until ready to serve. I use a teaspoon to fill my whites, but a pastry bag with a pretty tip would make them more festive.

The Easter Ham

As far as the ham goes, I think everyone has their favorite glaze – and some people don't like any – but it is entirely whatever your family prefers. We drain the juice from a can of pineapple chunks into a bowl; add enough brown sugar to make a paste – not real thick – and a squirt of mustard. When the ham is almost done (about 30

minutes before it is ready) take it out of the oven and score the outside (not real deep) in diamond shapes. With toothpicks put the pineapple chunks on the ham and spoon the juice mixture

over that. Put back in the oven until it is done.

When it comes to the potatoes we really cheat here! We have found that the boxed ones

are good, and a lot less trouble. With our gang, usually between 15 and 20, we usually use 10 to 12 boxes. Can you imagine peeling that many potatoes? You'd feel like you were on KP duty in the Army. We use about four disposable aluminum baking pans, cooking two pans at a time.

The balance of the meal is simple, and just whatever your family

likes.

Like so many of our meals (we have seven households coming together) there are always a lot of desserts. My sister usually

makes a coconut cake, I make a pineapple upside down cake (probably won't this year as my oven is on the fritz, and doubt if I can get it replaced before Easter), Adam will bring a couple of his apple pies and there will probably be a banana pudding (I can remember my grandma always made one for Thanksgiving dinner. But she made real pudding, not the boxed ones we use today).

I'm looking forward to more recipes from the Ranchos', Rolling Hills' or Bonnadelle's good cooks. Or how about kids? I'd love to do an article on kids' favorite foods – anything from hot dogs to s'mores.

My favorite Easter Hymn is Christ Arose! I get goose bumps when the chorus is sung, "Up from the grave he arose, with a mighty triumph o'er His foes, He arose a Victor from the dark domain, and He lives forever, with His saints to reign. He arose! He arose! Hallelujah! Christ arose!"

Lee has done a great job creating a realistic world that seems not too far off from our own, with a bit of magic thrown in the mix — which I always love.

fully. When the couple are arrested, they have made pledges that they will never betray each other. They know the authorities will be able to make them say whatever they want them to say — but in their hearts, they pledge, they will be true to their love. It is a promise that neither is finally able to keep.

After months of torture, Winston thinks that what awaits him is a bullet in the back of the head, the preferred method of execution of both the Nazis and the Soviet Communists. In Koestler's Darkness

at Noon, the protagonist walks down a basement hallway after confessing to crimes that he didn't commit, and ston. "The Party is not trying to imwithout any cere-prove you;" he says, "the Party mony he is shot in cares nothing about you." the back of the head - eradicated as if he were vermin.

Winston doesn't get off so easy. He will instead undergo an education, or more accurately a re-education. His final stages of torture are depicted as a kind of totalitarian seminar. The seminar is conducted by a man named O'Brien, who is portrayed marvelously in the film by Richard Burton. As he alternately raises and lowers the level of Winston's pain, O'Brien leads him to knowledge regarding the full meaning of the totalitarian regime.

As the first essential step of his education, Winston has to learn doublethink — a way of thinking that defies the law of contradiction. In Aristotle, the law of contradiction is the basis of all reasoning, the means of making sense of the world. It is the law that says that X and Y cannot be true at the same time if they're mutually exclusive. For instance, if A is taller than B and B is taller than C, C cannot be taller than A. The law of contradiction means things like that.

In our time, the law of contradiction would mean that a governor, say, could not simultaneously hold that the COVID pandemic renders church services too dangerous to allow, and also that massive protest marches are fine. It would preclude a man from declaring himself a woman, or a woman declaring herself a man, as if one's sex is simply a matter of what one wills it to be — and it would preclude others from viewing such claims as anything other than

The law of contradiction also means that we can't change the past. What we can know of the truth all resides in the past, because the present is fleeting and confusing

and tomorrow has yet to come. The past, on the other hand, is complete. Aristotle and Thomas Aquinas go so far as to say that changing the past — making what has been not to have been — is denied even to God. Because if something both happened and didn't happen, no human understanding is possible. And God created us with the capacity for understanding.

That's the law of contradiction, which the art of doublethink denies and violates. Doublethink is manifest in the fact that the state ministry in which Winston is tortured is called the Ministry of Love. It is manifest in the three slogans displayed on the

"Why do you think you are

being tortured?" O'Brien asks Win-

state's Ministry of "War is Truth: peace. Freedom is slavery. Ignorance is strength." And as we have seen, the regime in 1984 exists precisely to repeal the past. If the past can be changed, anything can be

changed — man can surpass even the power of God. But still, to what end?

"Why do you think you are being tortured?" O'Brien asks Winston. "The Party is not trying to improve you;" he says, "the Party cares nothing about you." Winston is brought to see that he is where he is simply as the subject of the state's power. Understanding having been rendered meaningless, the only competence that has meaning

"Already we are breaking down the habits of thought which have survived from before the Revolution." O'Brien says. "We have cut the links between child and parent, and between man and man, and between man and woman. No one dares trust a wife or a child or a friend any longer. But in the future, there will be no wives and no friends. Children will be taken from their mothers at birth, as one takes eggs from a hen. The sex instinct will be eradicated. Procreation will be an annual formality like the renewal of a ration card ... there will be no loyalty, except lovalty toward the Party. There will be no love, except the love of Big Brother. There will be no laughter, except the laugh of triumph over a defeated enemy ... all competing pleasures will be destroyed. But always - do not forget this Winston - always there will be the intoxication of power, constantly increasing and constantly growing subtler. Always, at every moment, there will be the thrill of victory, the sensation of trampling on an enemy who is helpless. If you want a picture of

Ranchos Update

We are now at a point where more people are qualifying for the COVID-19 vaccination, including food producers and farm workers. The Madera Farm Bureau is helping to advance the vaccination by coordinating with farmers and setting up locations for immunizations. Here is a synopsis of the vaccine creation process.

There are more vaccine candidates simultaneously in the pipeline for COVID-19 than ever before for an infectious disease. All of them are trying to achieve the same thing: Immunity to the virus and the possibility some might also be able to stop transmission. They do so by stimulating an immune response to an antigen, a molecule found on the virus. In the case of COVID-19, the antigen is typ-

ically the characteristic spike protein found on the surface of the virus, which it normally uses to help it invade human cells. There are four categories of vaccines in clinical trials: Whole virus, protein subunit, viral vector and nucleic acid (RNA and DNA). Some of them try to smuggle the antigen into the body, others use the body's own cells to make the viral antigen.

Many conventional vaccines use whole viruses to trigger an immune response. There are two main approaches: Live attenuated vaccines use a weakened form of the virus that can still replicate without causing illness; inactivated vaccines use viruses whose genetic material has been destroyed so they cannot replicate but can still trigger an immune response. Both types use wellestablished technology and pathways for regulatory approval, but live attenuated ones may risk causing disease in people with weak immune systems and often require careful cold storage, making their use more challenging in low-resource countries. Inactivated virus vaccines can be given to people with compromised immune systems but might also need cold storage.

Subunit vaccines use pieces of the

pathogen – often fragments of protein – to trigger an immune response. Doing so minimizes the risk of side effects, but it also means the immune response may be weaker. Therefore, they often require adjuvants to help boost the immune response. An example of an existing subunit vaccine is the hepatitis B vaccine.

Nucleic acid vaccines use genetic material - either RNA or DNA - to provide cells with the instructions to make the antigen. In the case of COVID-19, this is usually the viral spike protein. Once this genetic material gets into human cells, it uses our cells' protein factories to make the antigen that will trigger an immune response. The advantages of such vaccines are that they are easy to make and less expensive. Viral vector vaccines also work by giving cells genetic instructions to produce antigens, but they differ from nucleic acid vaccines in that they use a harmless virus, different from the one the vaccine is targeting, to deliver these instructions into the cell. One type of virus that has often been used as a vector is adenovirus, which causes the common cold. As with nucleic acid vaccines, our own cellular machinery is hijacked to produce the

antigen from those instructions in order to trigger an immune response. You can go to www.gavi.org for more vaccine information

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Letter Answering Time

Hello, 93636.

When the Ranchos Independent editor originally approached me about writing an automotive column, he envisioned readers submitting questions with me offering automotive advice. This month I received an email from an Independent reader so let's see how his concept works out.

"Hi Warren. Your In Good Hands articles are always very informative and entertaining at the same time. Your recent article Checking Check Balls was one of my favorites. I even read parts to my wife. She asked me a question I really don't have a good answer for. She drives a 2014 Nissan 370Z but since COVID she is driving less than 3,000 miles per year. Some people think she should have her oil changed every 3 months anyway. Prior to having a company car, I would change my personal vehicle's oil every 3,000 miles. Interesting to me my 2015 Ford Pick-Up service intervals were every 10,000 miles but my new 2020 Ford Pick-Up interval is 7,500 miles with the same 3.5L Eco Boost engine. My company car service agreement is 5,000 mile service intervals. What do you say?

"I'm also interested in your views concerning service items like radiator flushes, differential gear oil changes, fuel injector service, etc. Some of these seem to me to be over the top. Would love to hear your take. Rodney."

Thank you, Rodney, for your kind words and questions.

My way of thinking is this: Vehicle manufacturers are hoping you will be brand loyal and purchase your next new vehicle from them also. If their vehicle's reliability is too low or its maintenance costs are too high, it would be a deterrent. The manufacturer's recommendations are designed to ensure the greatest reliability at the least costs.

Your owner's manual shows two different maintenance schedules: "Normal" and "Severe Duty." Severe duty driving conditions include primarily short trips of five miles or less, stop and go and/or dusty driving conditions, very hot, very cold, heavy loads or towing a trailer. All Ranchos vehicles fall into the severe duty category due to the valley's summer heat, dust and wildfire particulates. Depending on driving style and vehicle, I generally recommend a

service interval exactly in the middle. I do not recommend "normal" maintenance service recommendations, Rodney.

Many newer vehicles have an in-vehicle maintenance reminder system that records a number of operating conditions like cold starts, average distance traveled per trip, engine temperatures, average speed, etc. It calculates the

maintenance strategy and turns on the "Maintenance Reminder Lamp" when it's time for an engine oil change, fluid level checks, component inspections and other car maintenance services. I endorse the Maintenance Reminder Systems and I rely on them to serv-

ice my family's vehicles.

With regard to oil change intervals, sludge is the greatest determinate. Sludge is oil that has turned into a thick black goo which clings to everything and restricts small oil passageways. Sludge is created when engine oil is contaminated with carbon from the combustion process and water vapor from condensation. A few minutes at freeway speeds allows the oil to warm up enough to evaporate the water. Sludge also forms when high heat conditions cause oil breakdown. Fortunately, sludge and varnish deposits are something oil manufacturers can control. Synthetic oil is a highly refined oil with high-performing additives created in a lab for uniformity and a more consistent oil flow during all normal engine temperature fluctuations. Under a microscope, a drop of synthetic oil shows millions of molecules all nearly the same size and structure. Full synthetic oils use synthetic base stocks with high performing additives. Conventional oil is refined from crude oil and under a microscope shows millions of molecules all with different shapes, sizes and structures. An American Automobile Association study of conventional oils vs full synthetic oils found on average full synthetic oils outperformed conventional oils by 47 percent with shear stability, deposit formation, volatility, cold-temperature pumpability, oxidation resistance and viscosity changes.

At my shop the engine oil change is only ONE component of the vehicle service interval process. The proactive visual vehicle inspection is just as important. Although I'm not opposed to a yearly oil change at 3,000 miles, I don't like the increased risk of break downs that comes with the lower inspection rate.

In my personal daily drivers, I use conventional oil unless the manufacturer recommendation is otherwise. Mine all have 200,000 – 330,000 miles on the clock so I would rather spend the money on frequent inspections instead of expensive oil. That's just my opinion.

Cooling system services are generally rec-

ommended every five years or 150,000 miles. Ethylene glycol does not wear out, but the lubricants, silicates, phosphates and other coolant additives do. The proper pH range for a modern cooling system is 9.8-10.5. Neglecting your cooling system will cost you BIG. I strongly agree with the manufacturer's recommendations.

Transmission fluid service recommenda-

tions are generally 100,000 miles. I prefer 60,000 - 90,000 miles. I also prefer fluid exchanges rather than filter replacements. Keeping the fluid clean will keep the filter clean.

Differential fluid replacement recommendations

are generally 150,000 miles. I agree.

At my shop we test the brake fluid every oil service and our recommendations are according to the test results.

Power steering fluid is the most neglected

fluid in my opinion. It's hard to gauge and the Bureau of Automotive Repair frowns on recommendations based on color. Power Steering fluid exchanges are inexpensive, so my general recommendation is every 60,000 with synthetic fluid.


With regard to fuel injection service, the typical gasoline port fuel injection service recommendation is every 60,000 to 90,000 miles. If your fuel mileage is normal and there are no drivability issues, it's not something I automatically recommend. If your vehicle is a Gasoline Direct Injection vehicle the recommendation is 40,000 - 60,000 miles. Based on my training I strongly agree.

OK Rodney, that's all for this one. Hope this helps.

the future, imagine a boot stamping on a human face — forever."

Nature is ultimately unchangeable, of course, and humans are not God. Totalitarianism will never win in the end — but it can win long enough to destroy a civilization. That is what is ultimately at stake in the fight we are in. We can see today the totalitarian impulse among powerful forces in our politics and culture. We can see it in the rise and imposition of doublethink, and we can see it in the increasing attempt to rewrite our history.

"An informed patriotism is what we want," Ronald Reagan said toward the end of his Farewell Address as president in January 1989. "Are we doing a good enough job teaching our children what America is and what she represents in the long history of the world?"

Then he issued a warning.

"Those of us who are over 35 or so years of age grew up in a different America. We were taught, very directly, what it means to be an American. And we absorbed, almost in the air, a love of country and an appreciation of its institutions. If you didn't get these things from your family you got them from the neighborhood, from the father down the street who fought in Korea or the family who lost someone at Anzio. Or you could get a sense of patriotism from

school. And if all else failed you could get a sense of patriotism from the popular culture. The movies celebrated democratic values and implicitly reinforced the idea that America was special. TV was like that, too, through the mid-sixties.

"But now, we're about to enter the [1990s], and some things have changed. Younger parents aren't sure that an unam-

bivalent appreciation of America is the right thing to teach modern children. And as for those who create the popular culture, well-grounded patriotism is no longer the style ... we've got to do a better job of getting across that America is freedom — freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom of enterprise. And freedom is special and rare. It's fragile; it needs protection.

"So, we've got to teach history based not on what's in fashion but what's important — why the Pilgrims came here, who Jimmy Doolittle was, and what those 30 seconds over Tokyo meant. You know, four years ago on the 40th anniversary of D-Day, I read a letter from a young woman writing to her late father, who'd fought on Omaha Beach ... she said, 'we will always remember, we will never forget what the boys of Normandy did.' Well, let's help her keep her word. If we forget what we did, we won't know who we are. I'm warning of an eradication of the American memory that could result, ultimately, in an erosion of the American spirit."

American schoolchildren today learn two things about Thomas

Jefferson: That he wrote the Declaration of Independence and that he was a slaveholder. This is a stunted and dishonest teaching about Jefferson. What do our schoolchildren not learn? They don't learn what Jefferson wrote in *Notes on the State of Virginia*: "I tremble for my country when I reflect that God is just." He wrote in that book regarding the contest between the master and the slave. "The Almighty has no attribute which can take side with us in such a contest." If schoolchildren learned that, they would see that Jefferson was a complicated man, like most of us.

They don't learn that when our nation first expanded, it was into the Northwest Territory, and that slavery was forbidden in that territory. They don't learn that the land in that territory was ceded to the federal government from Virginia, or that it was on the motion of Thomas Jefferson that the condition of the gift was that slavery in that land be eternally forbidden. If schoolchildren learned that, they would come to see Jefferson as a human being who inherited things and did things himself that were terrible, but who regretted those things and fought against them. And they would learn, by the way, that on the scale of human achievement, Jefferson ranks very high. There's just no question about that, if for no other reason than that he was a prime agent in founding the first republic dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Depriving the young of the spirit

of freedom will deprive us all of our

country. It could deprive us, finally,

of our humanity itself.

The astounding thing, after all, is not that some of our Founders were slaveholders. There was a lot of slavery back then, as there had been for all of recorded time. The astounding thing — the miracle, even, one might say — is that these slaveholders founded a republic based on principles designed to abnegate slavery.

To present young people with a full and honest account of our nation's history is to invest them with the spirit of freedom. It is to teach them something more than why our country deserves their love, although that is a good in itself. It is to teach them that the people in the past, even the great ones, were human and had to struggle. And by teaching them that, we prepare them to struggle with the problems and evils in and around them. Teaching them instead that the past was simply wicked and that now they are able to see so perfectly the right, we do them a disservice and fit them to be slavish, incapable of developing sympathy for others or undergoing trials on their own.

Depriving the young of the spirit of freedom will deprive us all of our country. It could deprive us, finally, of our humanity itself. This cannot be allowed to continue. It must be stopped.

mission will then make a determination after the hearing as to whether the needs presented are "reasonable." After all existing services, or the creation of new transit systems, have been expanded to their fullest and County transportation needs are still unmet, the Commission may release remaining Transportation Development Act funds for street and road purposes, such as repair, reconstruction or other uses.

The hearing will be held to take testimony on Wednesday, April 21, 3 p.m., via GoToWebinar. Due to these unprecedented times, this meeting will only be held virtually. turn to in-person instruction. From the very beginning, we have fought the requirement to remove our kids from their classrooms. Last year, our school board and district held out as long as we could prior to sending kids to distance learning. Even then, we pushed to honor our seniors by not only doing a virtual graduation, and with the help of the LHS staff, we held a scaled-down, in-person graduation that was well received.

At the beginning of this school year, we were very clear: Our goal was to open the doors and have students in front of their teachers. Unfortunately, one of the biggest ideals of an elected school board was removed: Local control. The Governor opted instead to make the decision under emergency powers to force everyone into distance learning. This did not sit well with this Board, and we asked for a closed session conversation with legal counsel to discern our options and clarify what would happen if we choose to move forward and open schools anyway. The potential penalties to the district - and frankly, to us as individuals – was great enough that we were forced to comply with the order. Since that day, however, we have been looking for every possible way to return our students to in-person instruction. We have also worked hard to offer choices for our students and families because we feel it is important to give families choices to meet their needs. We were the first in the County to receive the waiver and return elementary schools to in-person instruction. This waiver process, however, could not include our high school and middle school population.

In October, the principals from Liberty High School and Ranchos Middle School presented to us their approach to returning kids to campus based on the rules at that time. We felt like we were close in Madera County to being able to meet the requirements to open our doors, but unfortunately, as a County, we did not meet the Red Tier requirements for long enough, like our neighboring counties of Merced and Fresno did. At that time, we passed a resolution, which we reviewed and updated at Tuesday's board meeting, to give instructions to

SAY YOU SAW IT IN the Ranchos Independent open the doors as soon as we can.

With the lifting of the recent stay-athome order, we are planning for, yet again, a return to some version of in-person instruction at each of our school sites. In preparation, we have been able to work with Brett Frazier, our local county Supervisor, to make the vaccine available for our staff age 50 plus and even a quick clinic for all of our educational staff. The latter was performed on very short notice, and we still have some staff that want to take advantage of this. I have asked the principals to be ready with a list of those staff who are still wanting the vaccine, so that I can work with the County in hopes to finish that project.

At our February 9 board meeting, we announced we were able to work with Madera County Public Health to have them reevaluate their view on what should constitute our campus staying open. This reevaluation of the waiver was not just a matter of reading the waiver closer; actual changes were made at the County level regarding the interpretation of the waiver. This was accomplished because of the diligent work by our nurse, teachers, and staff about following the safety guidelines and diligently contact tracing. Thank you.

At the February 23 board meeting, the opening plans for our secondary schools were presented as well as the expanded view of cohorts that Dr. Paul talked about earlier this month. The board also reviewed the resolution reaffirming our commitment to putting our students back in their desks on campus as soon as we legally can. We are exploring every opportunity and avenue to fast track our approach and will continue to work toward the end goal of full in-person instruction for all of our students.



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
