

n Thursday Sept. 19, Highway 99 at Avenue 12 was shut down for approximately an hour as the result of a shooting that occurred in downtown Fresno. Fresno police discovered that two people who had been shot in Fresno, had inexplicably driven north to Madera County and came to rest on Highway 99 near Avenue 12. Their discovery

prompted officials to shut down the highway for approximately an hour before it reopened around 8:30 p.m.

Police said the shooting happened just after 6 p.m near G Street and San Benito, near the Poverello House, when a vehicle pulled up to the victims' car and someone inside opened fire. When the police arrived, both parties were gone, but they did find shell casings on the ground. Police also received reports of a red and a green vehicle involved in a

shooting, but they don't know if it was the same incident.

Approximately 10 minutes later, Fresno Police got a report of a car driving erratically northbound on Highway 99 near Clinton Avenue and the vehicle matched the description of the car that had been shot. The person who reported the car also noted that there was a bullet hole in the car. Approximately 20 minutes later, the car was stopped by the California Highway Patrol on Highway 99 near Avenue 12.

CHP officers found three people in the car, a man and

two women. The man, who was driving the car, and one of the women were both suffering from gunshot wounds. All three of the suspects were described as being in their 20s but as of press time, none have been identified. The two injured occupants were transported to Community Regional Medical Center and are reported in stable condition. Their injuries

> were reported as non life-threatening.

led to the shooting, or a reason why the Madera County. Additionally, there is no information on the shooting suspect, or suspects, or the vehicle used in the shooting. Police said they haven't determined whether or not the incident was possibly gang related. Police said that the victims in the hospital have not been cooperative

answering questions.

The 2017 crime rate in Fresno, the most current according to the City-Data.com crime index, is 1.3 times greather than the U.S. average. It was higher than 87.8 percent of other U.S. cities. The number of homicides stood at 56, an increase of 17 compared to 2016. In the last five years Fresno has seen increasing violent crime and decreasing property crime.

## **Online Scam Hitting Madera**

A new scam is finding its way into Madera social media and blogger sites. The Better Business Bureau says companies are contacting people and asking if they are interested in becoming a "brand ambassador" or "influencer." They claim all the job requires is for the person to post pictures or videos of themselves using or wearing the company's products and in exchange they will get a commission, free products or more exposure for their account. Kayla Gilbert with the BBB says these deals sound too good to be true because they are.

"We're just warning consumers to be very cautious if a company does contact you," Gilbert said. "A lot of times they will require upfront money so they may ask you to send money, either through a gift card or wiring money, and you receive a product and it's either damaged or it's not even worth \$50."

In addition to broken or cheap items, victims say they never received the promised commission or exposure.

## Troubleshooter Takeaways

- *Do not send money* If someone asks you to pay to start a job – red flag!
- Do your research Search the company name online and look for reviews or comments.

## Madera Tough **On Single Moms**

Single mothers in America face unique challenges, circumstances and responsibilities, and are often more likely to live in poverty. 247WallSt.com compiled a Top 10 list of the toughest cities across America to be a single mom, according to indicators like rent, median income and access to preschool. Of the top 10 toughest cities to be a single mom, Madera was ranked #3.

Rent for a two-bedroom apartment in Madera averages \$1,020 per month. To afford that rental without spending 30 percent of her income on rent, she would need to work 98.6 hours a week, one of the longest workweeks of any U.S. city.

Also, Madera has one of the lowest preschool enrollment rates of any metro area. Just 33.9 percent of 3- and 4-yearolds are enrolled in school, far less than the 47.5 percent national enrollment rate.

## Youth Psych Hospital to be Built at Valley Children's

A new children's behavioral health facility is going to be built at Valley Children's Hospital's Madera location, in association with Universal Health Services. The 81,600-squarefoot, 128-bed behavioral health hospital will provide accessible, high-quality and advanced behavioral health services in the Central Valley, with one 24bed unit being dedicated specifically to pediatric psychiatric care, treatment, built specifically to assist Valley Chil- Hospital. dren's Emergency Department, addi-

tional units at the new behavioral health hospital are being planned to serve adults and seniors. The new hospital will employ more than 250 people, including clinicians, nurses, mental health technicians, support staff and administrators.

"There is hardly a day that goes by that I don't get a question from a parent, a healthcare provider or a community member in search of behavioral healthcare for their kids," said Todd Suntrapak, president and CEO of Valley Children's Healthcare. "And, in particular, behavioral healthcare that is right here in the Valley." Suntrapak said that the behavioral healthcare needs for Valley chil-

dren and families were significant and that this new facility would provide Valley residents with new resources closer to home.

The new facility will feature a full array of inpatient services, including units designed specifically for children and adolescents ages 5 to 17. Specialty programs for adults with behavioral health and substance use issues will be offered, and the facility will offer outpatient programs including child, adolescent and family counseling, and treatment for depression, anxiety dis-

orders and other common behavioral health issues.

The shortage of facilities is staggering. In Valley Children's 12-county service area, there are 929,436 children between the ages of 6 to 17 and only 49 current beds. That means there is one bed for every 18,968 children or adolescents.

Construction of the new hospital is expected to begin next year, with an estimated opening of 2022. Valley Children's and UHS will immediately begin work on a psychiatry residency program, as well as telepsychology services for children served by the Valley Children's network of care.

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

## Owning Gun a God-Given Right

The fastest way to trend on Twitter, and not in a good way, is to say that the right to bear arms is a Godgiven right.

Texas state Rep. Matt Schaefer established this beyond a doubt in a Twitter thread in the aftermath of the West Texas shooting spree. He said that he wouldn't use "the evil acts of a handful of people to diminish the God-given rights of my fellow Texans."

Progressives were aghast, and when actress Alyssa Milano objected, Texas Sen. Ted Cruz jumped in to support Schaefer's argument (in less bombastic terms).

The basic proposition isn't hard to defend, and indeed it is written into our fundamental documents. This doesn't mean that God wants you to own an AR-15, or that every jot and tittle of our current gun regime is divinely mandated. Far from it. Yet there is a natural right to self-defense, and gun ownership is inherently connected to that right in a modern society.

This is glossed over even by Democrats who have a connection to America's culture of gun ownership. Minnesota Sen. Amy Klobuchar said the other week, "I look at [gun legislation] and I always say, 'Does this

hurt Uncle Dick in his deer stand?"
That's not the question, though. The
Second Amendment isn't fundamentally about Uncle Dick bagging deer,
but about his ability to defend himself
and his family.

The notion of God-given rights shouldn't be controversial. It is a bedrock of the American creed, written into the Declaration of Independence. Its preamble says, of course, that all men "are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights."

The Bill of Rights numbers "the right of the people to keep and bear Arms" among those unalienable rights. Why? Because the founders believed that everyone has an inherent right to self-defense.

As David Harsanyi notes in his history of the gun in America, "First Freedom," John Adams said in his defense of one of the British soldiers charged in the Boston Massacre in 1770 that self-defense was "the primary canon in the law of nature."

Owning a gun is an extension of this law of nature and has been recognized as such for a long time in Anglo-America. The right to bear arms had deep roots in England, and predated the Constitution on these shores.


There was no doubt at the time about the importance of the right to bear arms. Harsanyi writes that "not a single soul in the provisional government or at the Second Continental Congress or any delegate at the Constitutional Convention -- or, for that matter, any new American -- ever argued against the idea of individuals owning a firearm."

None of this is necessarily a trump card in the gun control debate - the most commonly proposed gun control restrictions wouldn't substantially lessen gun ownership. It does mean, though, that there is a limit to how far gun control can go in America and that proponents of new restrictions should be fully aware that they are tampering with a constitutionally protected individual right.

If Uncle Dick likes to hunt, good for him. But his right to own a firearm doesn't begin or end there.



## What a Crock!

Have you been out running errands all afternoon and get home with only half an hour to get something ready for dinner before going to get the kids from their practices and at two different fields? You only have a couple of choices: Open a can of soup and sandwiches or go buy take out. If you had put something in the crockpot before you left this morning, dinner would be readv.

Do you have a crockpot, or what some people call a "slow cooker," and it's in the back of the

time, with just me, I use the smaller one. The only thing with the smaller one is it only cooks on high, but that isn't a problem when I know I won't be away from the house more than three or four hours.

I love corned beef and cabbage. Every March when corned beef goes on sale I buy one and put it in my big crock pot. However, I don't cook the cabbage in the crockpot because I like crispy cabbage not over-cooked from the crockpot. I cook the corned beef in the crockpot for 8 - 10 hours and when it is done, I slice the cabbage and put it in a large frying pan with salt and pepper and some juices from the crockpot. Put a lid on the pan and let the cabbage steam. This doesn't take long and I can control the doneness of the cabbage.



For my last month's article, remembering Brenda, my late niece, her daughter sent me a list of her favorite meals. On that list was Beef Stroganoff but I wasn't able to include a recipe in my article because I just didn't have the space. The other day Randy was telling me how good a Beef Stroganoff recipe was that they cooked in the crockpot. I thought that was perfect – I'll do my article on crockpot recipes, and include one of Brenda's fa-

### Crockpot Beef Stroganoff

1-2 lbs. cube steak, cut into one-inch pieces or 1-2 lbs. stew beef, cut into ½ inch pieces.

2 cans condensed golden mushroom soup (no substitutes!)

1 C chopped onion

1 Tb. Worcestershire sauce

1 14 oz. can beef broth

8 oz. button mushrooms. cleaned and quartered (optional)

Salt and pepper to taste

ounces cream cheese, room tempera-

½ cup sour cream

In the crockpot, combine the meat, soup, onion Worcestershire sauce, beef broth, mushrooms, salt and pepper. Cook on low for 5-6 hours. Stir in the cream cheese and sour cream about half an hour before serving, stirring every 10 minutes or so to break up the cream cheese. Serve over cooked egg noodles or rice. (After the egg noodles have cooked, I like to add them directly into the crockpot for about half an hour for the flavors to mingle and thicken up a bit.) If the sauce is not thick enough for you, add some cornstarch and water. (Randy said it will come out PLENTY thick. Also, he used stew meat instead of cubed steak and

said it was awesome!)

I know you can cook most things faster on the top of the stove or in the oven, but you have to be there to stir it or watch it while it is coking. Just think of the things you can or should be doing while your food is cooking. The other advantage to crockpot cooking is the clean up after. When I make spaghetti sauce on top of the stove my pretty white stove looks like a tomato exploded on it.

## Crockpot Spaghetti Sauce

- 2 lbs. ground beef
- 1 small onion chopped
- 1 clove garlic minced
- 2 cans diced tomatoes
- 2 cans tomato sauce
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tsp. Italian seasoning
- 1 envelope Spaghetti sauce sea-

soning mix

Heat some oil in the bottom of a frying pan. Sauté the onions and garlic until soft, add the beef and cook until browned, making sure to crumble the meat as it cooks. With a slotted spoon, spoon the mixture into the bottom of your crockpot. Stir in the remaining ingredients. Place the lid on the pot and cook on low for 8 hours. Serve over cooked spaghetti pasta. If you have any sauce left over, it can be stored in zip lock bags and frozen until you want spaghetti again.

One thing with a crockpot, you can cook almost everything from soup to nuts in it. Well, maybe not nuts, but desserts for sure.

While doing my research on this article I came across this recipe for Piña Colada Bars. Thought it looked yummy and who doesn't like coconut and pineapple. Well, I know two

girls that don't, and one of them doesn't even eat meat – so go figure!

#### Piña Colada Bars

Nonstick cooking spray

2 C sweetened shredded coconut

1 C (2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened

2/3 C granulated sugar

- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 large egg
- 2 C. all-purpose flour
- 3 ounces cream cheese
- 1 (20 oz.) can crushed pineapple
- 1/4 C. brown sugar
- 1 Tbs. cornstarch
- Preheat oven to 375.

Line stoneware with foil. Spray with nonstick spray.

Spread coconut evenly on baking sheet, toast in oven 10-15 minutes, stirring every 5 minutes. Remove from oven and allow to cool.

With your mixer on medium high, beat butter, sugar and salt until well combined. Beat in egg and vanilla. On low, beat in flour and half of toasted coconut, scraping side of bowl occasionally. Spread dough evenly in stoneware. Place small chunks of cream cheese over dough.

Drain pineapple and press firmly into strainer to remove all excess liquid, transfer the drained pineapple to a medium bowl. Add brown sugar and cornstarch to pineapple, stir to combine. Spread pineapple mix over dough. Put cover on crockpot and cook on LOW 4 to 5 hours or on HIGH 3 hours, until edges are crisp and golden brown. Remove stoneware from base and cool on a wire rack. Holding edges of foil, lift bars from stoneware. Sprinkle with remaining coconut. Cut into bars – enjoy!





Stopping and Starting

I loved tucking in my kids when they were young. It was a quiet moment at the end of the day to talk, sing and pray together. When they were older, I remember thinking, "When and how did it stop?" It's not like you decide and say, "OK, this is the last week I'll be tucking you in." It just sort of happens.

Becoming disorganized can be like that too. It's not, "OK, this is the week I'm going to stop putting things away." Or, "As of today I'm going to start buying more than I need and save everything." Yet, it happens. Many of my clients begin our first encounter with, "I used to be organized!"

I remember a conversation with a woman who had cleaned out her deceased grandmother's home. There were signs of hoarding as she sorted through layers and layers of stuff. Recalling the process, she said, "When I got to the bottom layer of clutter, I noticed it was from the year my grandmother was forced to retire." That is not insignificant. Transitions, good and bad, are often catalysts to disorganization.

Some people stop being organized when physical challenges arise—surgery, cancer, disease. For others, it's triggered by mental or emotional health issues—brain injury, memory loss, anxiety, grief or depression. However, it's not only negative circumstances that contribute to disorganization. Having kids, starting a new job or moving to a new house can create chaos as well.

Clutter is often triggered by change. If you can't bend or lift like you used to, you might notice more things being left out on the countertop. If your new job has you working 12-hour days, you may be too exhausted to maintain things at home. If before blending families you were just three, and now you're a family of

eight, that transition is likely going to challenge your organizing skills.

So, we know what stops organization. How do you restart? Begin the process by looking back to a time when you were more organized. Chances are you had at least some of these basic principles in place:

- 1. There was less stuff. Due to shopping therapy or additional people in the home, there might be way more stuff. Less is still more when it comes to a peaceful and productive environment. Scale back to what you need, use and love. Donate the rest.
- 2. You had a home for everything. That's a lot easier task when you have less stuff (see principle number one). Make sure you're putting things you use most often in accessible places, especially if you're challenged physically. Store like things together and label shelves, bins, etc.
- 3. You put things away. This is an easier task when everything has a home (see principle number two). When you're stressed and hurried it's easy to let things slide. The problem is, that two-minute task of putting the dishes in the dishwasher or hanging up your clothes becomes an overwhelming project when left undone for several days or weeks. So, if it takes less than two minutes, do it now.
- 4. You had routines. At work there's a system for processing paperwork. At home it's often a different story. Even in retirement, more time doesn't always translate into better organization, but routines do. Create routines to support the daily tasks that are necessary for maintaining organization.

Depending on the severity of the circumstances that stopped you from being organized, you need to give yourself grace in the process of getting reorganized. You may need help even to do things of which you were at one time completely capable. Left unchecked, clutter and chaos will grow along with your stress and anxiety.

While becoming disorganized doesn't happen by choice, getting organized is always a choice. You CAN regain peace and productivity.



## Taking it Personally

Hello 93636,

In 1976, then-California Governor Jerry Brown signed the Educational Employment Relations Act of 1976, giving collective bargaining rights to schools and community college employees. That legislation was the beginning of the end for California public school vocational education programs in my opinion. With collective bargaining agreements, wages and benefits rapidly increased. School districts were forced to cut back on programs like vocational education in order to balance their budgets. By the mid-1990s, many of California's traditional vocational education programs were eliminated due to lack of funding. Because of the loss of those vocational edprograms, California's automotive repair industry has suffered from a substantial technician shortage. Sixty-six per cent of the current automotive technician workforce is 45 years or older. Less than three percent are ages 18-24. Because of the severe shortage of qualified automotive repair technicians, some local automotive repair facilities have turned to technology for help. Employee training and new school technology has helped us improve efficiency and production. Last year after seven years of investment, I lost a key employee. It took nine months and three new hires to replace the skill set of one skilled technician. The strategy I employed to cope with the technician shortage clearly was inadequate.

## Taking it Personally

As president of the Fresno Select Group, I decided to make the local technician shortage one of our issues. The Fresno Select Group is an organization of NAPA AutoCare Center owners cooperatively working together to build our businesses and positively impact our industry and community.

You may recognize us from our "Wheels of Hope" giveaways. We give two vehicles away each year to a needing and deserving family. Our first opportunity came last year with the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools Career Tech EXPO at Chukchansi Park. Fresno Unified School District alone is the third largest school district in the State

of California. When Clovis, Central, Reedley, Selma, Kingsburg and other school districts within the county are included, the Career Fair presented a tremendous opportunity for us to display our technology and speak with hundreds of high school students about opportunities within our local automotive repair job market.

We took several vehicles and connected our substantial new school technology to demonstrate what we do. Although we didn't know it at the time, the four shops who participated in that event would become the nucleus of what was about to come.

Instead of being competitors, we began sharing and supporting each other with difficult vehicle diagnostics. Since we were all using the same Pico digital storage oscilloscope technologies, we began sharing waveforms, knowledge and information. On Feb. 2 of this year, we formed the Central California Pico Club (CCPC). The CCPC is a grassroots effort of local independent auto repair facilities, purposed to train and teach us and "Career Technology Education" (CTE) instructors in the use of Picoscope automotive technology.

At our monthly meetings we share information, teach case studies, teach each other the new Picoscope technology learned the previous month and we practice. Within the city limits of Fresno there are only two public high schools with a CTE automotive program, Duncan Polytechnical and Central. It was very fortuitous to us that Golden Valley Unified's former superintendent, Andrew Alvarado, was the new superintendent of the Central Unified School District so we started there. When we contacted Superintendent Alvarado, he was happy to have CCPC as advisors to his CTE automotive program.

#### A Pleasant Surprise

When we visited the Central High School facility, we were pleased to find Picoscope Technology. The instructor however had not received training with the technology and he was very receptive to learning. We invited Robert to participate with us during our monthly CCPC meetings and his progress has been phenomenal. Within four months he wrote a basic Picoscope curriculum and began teaching it to his students. Soon Duncan Polytechnical and Clovis High School also joined CCPC. All three instructors learn and train free of charge, side by side with our technicians. Last night I received in part this email from the Fresno City College CTE Department. I would like to share it with you.


"Hi Warren, ... I recently became aware of the Central California Pico Club. I would like to schedule a meeting with you and attend your events as an Educational Representative from Fresno City College. We would also like to partner with CCPC as an Educational Partner and host a CCPC Meeting at our FCC Automotive Technology Campus. We would like our students to attend your CCPC meetings for the purpose of establishing a relationship and providing our students with the newest Diagnostic Strategies and Diagnostic Tools and Equipment available.

WOW! CAN YOU BELIEVE IT? The CCPC will now have local high school instructors, junior college instructors, students and our working technicians in the same building at the same time sharing the same technology and training. I'm very hopeful we will collaborate and design a curriculum that will facilitate entry level high school students up to Associate of Science degrees from Fresno City College. If our local small business/educator partnership model is successful, I expect to see an improvement with our local automotive technician shortage in about three years.

## CBD Oil Can Interfere With Other Medications

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am a 49-yearold woman who had a massive heart attack in April. My father died of a massive heart attack at 49. I have four stents in three arteries and am on Brilinta, low-dose aspirin, blood pressure medication, etc.

I have essential tremor, first noticing the tremors in middle school. The tremor is in my hands, making writing nearly impossible, and I have head bobs. I have an internal tremor that never stops. A previous practitioner prescribed a month's trial of beta blockers several years ago. I noticed no relief with the tremor but was physically ill for the first 30 minutes of the morning in the first two weeks. Recently, I found an online blog regarding essential tremor and CBD oil. Nearly all of the bloggers found some level of relief using this treatment.

If I choose to try CBD oil to assist with my tremor, is there a risk of it interfering with my heart and blood pressure medications? -- M M

**ANSWER:** Cannabidiol, or CBD, is a nonpsychoactive substance found in Cannabis, as opposed to tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC, the best-known psychoactive component.

CBD is typically sold as an oil and has been receiving press as a potential treatment for a wide variety of medical issues. Many or most of these claims have no data to support them. Anecdotal reports, such as most blogs, are neither reliable nor scientific (and may or may not be true). There also is an issue with proving the dosage and purity of products said to contain CBD.

However, in the case of essential tremor, there is some evidence: Studies in mice have shown benefit with CBD, although a single case report showed effectiveness of THC but not CBD in essential tremor. The issue of drug interactions is a significant one. CBD inhibits two powerful pathways the body uses to detoxify drugs, the CPY3A4 and CYP2D6 systems. This is a serious issue for you. Ticagrelor (Brilinta), an anticoagulant, is metabolized by CYP3A4, as are some of the statin drugs usually prescribed to people with heart

blockages. The effect of the anticoagulant could be much higher than expected, leading to bleeding risk. Other commonly used heart medications are metabolized by CYP2D6, and the effect on these medications is unpredictable.

I can't recommend CBD products given the medications you are taking, but would suggest you consider alternative treatments. You may have read about deep brain stimulation and ultrasound, two powerful and effective treatments for people whose symptoms have not responded to standard treatments.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** This question is for my husband. How safe is drinking tea while on warfarin? He has his INR checked monthly, and for the most part it stays between 2 and 3. He watches his vitamin K intake regularly. He has read conflicting stories of how tea interacts with warfarin by making the INR levels high. -- S.J.

ANSWER: Tea comes in two major types: black tea, which is fermented, and green tea, which is not. Black tea has no known interactions with warfarin (Coumadin). Green tea contains small amounts of vitamin K, which could make the INR lower and the warfarin less effective. However, the effect is likely to be small. Further, if he drinks a consistent amount per day, his dose can be adjusted to reflect his vitamin K intake.



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

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## GO FIGURE! by Linda Thistle


